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<b>Track 1: Teaching &amp; Learning A</b>	<b>ACUE Lessons and Benefits</b>
<b>Presenter(s):</b>	<b>Cara Gomez</b> , <i>Public &amp; Allied Health Sciences, DSU</i>
This session will cover effective teaching strategies emphasized as part of the ACUE teaching certification. Feedback from students will also be shared to highlight their favorite strategies and what could be improved.	

<b>Track 2: Teaching &amp; Learning B</b>	<b>Teaching During the Pandemic and Moving Forward</b>

Due to the pandemic, we have drastically and irrevocably changed the way we teach and work. This presentation will focus on the advancements we have made with technology and course delivery over the past year as well as examine student survey data about course format preferences and experiences in an online and virtual environment. It will also include a discussion of strategies and steps to improve teaching at DSU with an emphasis on what course delivery may look like moving forward.

Key findings from the fall 2020 Academic Advising Survey will be shared to showcase areas of strength and opportunities for improvement. Potential strategies for improvement and collaborative efforts will also be discussed.	

<b>Track 4: Data &amp; Decision Making</b>	<b>Using Dashboards for Decision Support</b>
<b>Presenter(s):</b>	<b>Kimberley Sudler</b> , <i>Office of the Provost</i>
This session demonstrates the Decision Support Analytics dashboard suite developed for academic leaders to expand the use of actionable data for decision making, operations management, and student success. Designed in PowerBI, dashboards provide insights into several areas of interest for decision support: enrollment, graduation, classroom utilization, course management, faculty workloads, grades, and student success indicators. This integrative and adaptive tool utilizes census and timely operational data. An example of how the tool was used for decision making in a mathematics gateway course will also be highlighted.

To stay competitive and ascend from other institutions DSU must be aware of key metrics in comparison to these other institutions. The Office of Institutional Research, Planning, and Analytics (IRPA) conducted research using the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System to identify key common metrics for university comparison with peer, competitor and aspirational peer groups.

<b>Track 1: Teaching &amp; Learning A</b>	<b>Trust the Process: University Seminar Redesigned</b>

<p>The University Seminar course is essential to student success and was created to assist first-year students with academic support and college adjustment. In 2020, this course was restructured to provide a user-friendly and engaging online learning experience for students. This session will describe how the University Seminar Survey findings were used to improve the course by assessing strengths and growth opportunities.</p>

<p>Key findings from the DSU course evaluation results will be shared and opportunities for collaborating to increase response rates will be explored.</p>	

<b>Track 3: Student Services</b>	<b>Honors/Experiential Learning: Transition from Scholars to Global Leaders</b>

<p>The presentation will cover the areas of data collection of Internship information sessions, professional development workshops, and the Honors Program. Building partnerships with the university’s four colleges: CAST, CHBS, CHESS, and COB has started. The Office of URELAH has plans to develop methods to codify and assess data on student participation in undergraduate research and experiential learning activities at the University. The integration of the Honors Program with undergraduate research and experiential learning creates a unit where students will be able to gain access to additional professional development resources and training opportunities.</p>	

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<b>Track 4: Data &amp; Decision Making</b>	<b>Student Progress Tools: Analyzing Department and Program Results</b>
<b>Presenter(s):</b>	<b>Brody Bluemel, <i>Languages and Literatures</i></b>
<p>This session will discuss the use of student progress tools to track student development in academic program(s). Examples from different programs will be overviewed, with a specific focus on literacy development. Results will be shared from English Composition and Speech pilot courses that were assessed and compared using the Assessment Data Collection System (ADCS) along with other data sources. Benefit of this analysis, validation of findings and the impact of changes will be shared. While general education courses lay a foundation for writing, collaborative opportunities for improving/emphasizing communication skills in the program level will also be proposed.</p>	

<b>Track 5: Institutional Reports</b>	<b>US World News Highlights and Benchmarks</b>
<b>Presenter(s):</b>	<b>Vaughn Hopkins, <i>Institutional Research Planning and Analytics</i> Gregory Moore, <i>Institutional Research Planning and Analytics</i> Deyon Winston, <i>Institutional Research Planning and Analytics</i></b>
<p>U.S. News &amp; World Report ranking measures the quality of undergraduate education at HBCU schools. In total, 77 HBCUs were ranked, with Delaware State University (DSU) ranking in at #11, up 2 spots from the previous year. This project conducts research on just the top 15 HBCU schools to analyze and determine how DSU compares with some of the HBCUs in the country.</p>

<p>Dr. Blumberg is an internationally recognized educator, presenter, writer, and consultant on promoting deep and lasting learning, learning-centered teaching, assessment of student learning, and effective teaching. She will be sharing the basics of curriculum mapping. Phyllis is an educational consultant collaborating with faculty and staff in all disciplines to enable students' engaged and deep learning. For twenty years she was the director of the Teaching and Learning Center at the University of the Sciences in Philadelphia. She also served as assistant provost for faculty and assessment development, research professor in education and psychology, and associate dean for curriculum. She taught first-year students through graduate and professional students at five institutions in North America. Phyllis is the author of more than 70 peer-reviewed articles and published three books on teaching in higher education. Phyllis earned her master's degree and a doctorate in educational and developmental psychology from the University of Pittsburgh Learning Research and Development Center.</p>
